NIEUW COUNTRY LLOFT

Brian and Marilyn Mckay restored a 220 year old Dutch Colonial home in New Paltz that was in the Van Orden family for almost 100 years. The following information comes from "The Record".

DESCRIPTION: 1 1/2 story stone house with brick facade and gambrel roof with flared eaves, typical of rural Dutch Colonial construction. Cedar Shingle Roof, double hung, small pane windows, three chimneys. Inside: exposed beams, wide floor boards, six fireplaces including Dutch "beehive" oven.

RESTORATION: The East and West walls were taken down and rebuilt. On first floor, narrow-strip oak floor removed to expose wide boards. Windows authentically restored using original sash as model. Layers of old roofing removed, cedar shingles installed. Cold cellar for storing vegetables now a wine cellar.

The McKays added two other authentic Colonial structures to the property. A stone house that dates to about 1740 was moved from nearby Modena and rebuilt stone by stone, as an addition to the main house, in which they run a bed and breakfast. The McKays saved from demolition an authentic Dutch Colonial barn in Kingston and had it transported to their back yard where it was restored with the help of Walden builder Sam Phelps, Jr.

HISTORY: Aaron Burr slept here. Burr was vice-president from 1801-1805, most remembered for shooting Alexander Hamilton in a duel, was litigating a New Paltz land dispute around the turn of the century. He sometimes stayed at the fashionable home which was then owned by friend Peter Van Orden who had acquired the house in the 1790's from the Shuart family. The house was built in 1773 by Johannes Shuart who was either Dutch or German. He had moved up from the Bergen County, New Jersey area. The flared eaves are more typical of that area than of Ulster County. Shuart ran a large farm with a grist mill and a distillery. Five slaves lived there according to a 1790 census. The home's brick facade, made from crude local bricks, was a status symbol. It was showing your best face to the road, said McKay."

VIDEO OF VAN ORDEN FAMILY HISTORICAL SITES

Melvin and Charmaine Van Orden, #41, with his brother and sister in-law, Maurice and Carol Van Orden, took a trip to the New York area where they visited many of the sites important to the the Van Orden branch of the family and some of the restored homes belonging to the Van Orden family. They graciously sent us a video of the trip for our library here and we had the fun of traveling and touring with them. For the most part Maurice manned the camera while Melvin interviewed and narrated. Melvin summarizes:

"Having received many requests for a report of our trip to New York; and knowing a picture is worth a thousand words, we have condensed the videos into one video. We will try and relate some of the highlights.

The first stop was at Fayette, New York, at the church which is described in church history (The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints). Across the street is the Fayette post office, where our wives had to send post cards back home, of course they had to have postmarks from there.

Next up the road a short distance was the L.D.S. chapel and visitor's center. It was here in Peter Whittmer's home that the church was organized.

Our next stop was at Moravia, New York, at the Cayuga Historical Society. It was here in Moravia that our family, along with several others, joined the Mormon Church shortly after it was organized. William and his wife Julia Ann moved here from Windham, York, in about 1830, as their first son Peter was born there in 1830. They lived here until 1841 when they started migrating to Nauvoo (Illinois), arriving there in 1843.

While at the Historical Society we found that our family was not the only family of Van Ordens to live there. John M. Van Orden was born there in 1831, and his grandfather also lived there. There is a reference to a Van Orden who joined the army during the Civil War and died in 1864. What a lot of research needs to be done. The country around Moravia is some of the most beautiful that I have ever seen, green rolling hills with lots of trees.

Next, Palmyra and the pageant, the printing press at Palmyra and Joseph Smith's home. The sacred grove, which my wife and brother would not let me walk through this year, had to sit in the shade and rest while they did the walking and took pictures for me. We did go up the hill to the top of Hill Cumorah; the view is marvelous. The pageant was so much better this year than we remembered it; as you will see, we really enjoyed it. there is one thing that we did find out; you can never get very far from home, met distant relatives, and the grandson of one of my old working friends.

The next stop was at the home of Barbara Van Orden Randall. Barbara is the daughter of Sam and Elsie Van Orden and has written many articles about the family, plus stories about the old times on the Embough. On a wall of her home hangs a quilt, made by her showing 30 blocks of her ancestors, about 10 in her direct line. It is beautiful. After much discussing of stealing it or borrowing it, the final verdict was for her to make one for me and Maurice. She is working on mine at the present time; and I have my fingers crossed waiting.

The next day we drove across the state to New Paltz where we stayed at the "Nieuw Country Lloft, 1773" for three days. These days were spent visiting Modena Cemetery, The Historical Society of New Paltz, old Van Orden homes, the Riverview Farm in Catskill and the Peter Van Orden Rural Cemetery on Windham Mountain.

The Nieuw House Country Lloft is an old home on All Husen Road built about 1740 and at present owned by Brian

and Marilyn McKay. They have restored it to its original condition and run a Bed and Breakfast Inn at the present time. What a royal treatment we received here, six course breakfast served on antique dishes. What a wonderful time we had. The house was purchased by Pieterese Van Orden in 1790 and for the next 100 years was kept in the family. Peter was known as the Soldier of the American Revolution; the story is that at about 15 years of age he was apprenticed out to a farmer, as he was hoeing potatoes, noticed a group of soldiers marching by. Throwing down his hoe, he jumped the fence and joined them and never did complete his apprenticeship.

A few of the things to note at the McKay's are the old candle light fixtures, the six fireplaces, the antique vases, furniture and woodwork. Brian is in the process of restoring an old Dutch Barn. Buying an old barn, tearing it down and rebuilding it board by board.

The next day we visited Leah Delameter, a descendant of Pieterese Van Orden Her home is a [beautiful] old Colonial House in which she lives alone. Leah gave us a royal welcome and a tour of her home. She has in her possession an old tile with our Coat of Arms on it. It was from this tile that we received the one we have today. It was first adopted by the family in 1635.

Our next stop was at the Solomon Van Orden home; an old colonial Mansion, beautifully kept up and very clean, manicured yard and a very royal tour of the house and the grounds. The home has at this time passed from the Van Orden family, but the owner's are proud of its tradition.

This afternoon we drove to the "River View Farm", the home of Sam and Elsie Van Orden. Elsie is a noted historian of the family and is a very gracious hostess. The home sits on the plot of ground that the original one, built by William and Elizabeth occupied in the early 1700's located by the shore of the Hudson River. Sam and Elsie are the eighth generation to live on the farm.

Leaving the Riverview Farm, we drove to Windham Mountain, stopping at the Tavern which is on the site of a tavern built by Peter Van Orden in the late 1700's, where he entertained travelers moving west. After much searching, we found the Peter Van Orden Rural Cemetery where Peter and his wife Mary are buried along with Captain Isaac Haight and several children. The cemetery is very run down and will soon be lost to our posterity.

Included in this video, you will find a short film about the William Van Orden House in Nauvoo. The home was located by Bruce Van Orden, #98 was bought by William in 1843 for \$750. His wife, Julia Ann Van Orden later in 1846 sold the house for \$250, what a sacrifice our pioneers had to make."

PETER MABIE'S REVOLUTIONARY WAR RECORD

Frances Thomas, #30 has located the Revolutionary War service record of Peter Mabie (173-1827). Peter married Susanna Sunderland.

JANET MABIE: REPORTER, WRITER & EDITOR

Frances Thomas is wondering if you can give her any more information about the life of Janet Mabie, reporter, writer and editor. Janet Mabie was born ca. 1892 and died ca. 1961. She lived in Boston. Frances knows she was a reporter for the Christian Science Monitor in the 1920's and interviewed President Hoover. She flew with Amelia Earhart and wrote about her in various publications. She ghost-wrote J. C. Penney's autobiography. After Amelia's death in 1937, Amelia's husband, George Putnam, hired Janet to work on a book called "Last Flight". Janet and Putnam had a falling out about the authorship of the book. Janet was married to a Walter Clapp and had a son, Kenneth. Her parents were Henry Clay and Edith Mabie. Frances tells us that she has tried all the usual places to find out more about her and would certainly welcome any information.

Louise tells us that it was a maze of coincidences that brought her to the Maybee Society.
