THE PIONEERS OF NEW FRANCE IN NEW ENGLAND

(With Contemporary letters and documents)

This is an interesting title! Who were the pioneers of New France and why were they in New England? According to the author, the pioneers of New France in the 1600's and 1700's were the Jesuit missionaries. This is the story of one Jesuit missionary who lived at an Indian village in what is south central Maine. The missionary was Pere Sebastian Rale and village was Norridgewock. Father Rale was shot by the English in 1724 and subsequently treated as a martyr.

The author uses many contemporary letters and other documents (many in French), to prove that the English were justified in their struggles against the French and Indians and that Rale, although slain, should not be treated as a martyr.

The book contains virtually no genealogical information, but is valuable for the many supporting documents and references used throughout. Period history of the Norridgewock and coastal Maine area is given in some detail and a few local people are mentioned by name as are a number of government officials.

ELMER VAN ORDEN & HIGH TOR

"The exposed face of the diabase is columnar in appearance. These columns were formed as the magma cooled and shrank. To the Indians, the Palisades were known as 'weehawkers' because the columns of rock resembled 'rows of trees'. If the Palisades were placed on end, the columns of diabase would look like stairs, and so to quarrymen the rock is usually referred to as trap rock, from the Dutch word 'trapp', meaning step. Whatever the name, the Palisades are an unusual geological formation, rivaled only by Fingal's Cave in Scotland and its continuation in Ireland, The Giant's Causeway.

Ever since the days of the Dutch, the tough diabase of Palisades and layers of sandstone have been looked upon as fair game by the quarrymen. The sandstones, which often contain hematite, giving the rock a striking color, were used during the nineteenth century for the building of the fashionable brownstone' houses of Manhattan. But the main game always lay in the diabase rock. It was used as both a building stone and a cheap ship ballast, and then it was employed in road construction after being broken into gravel. In the late nineteenth century, devastation of the Palisades grew, and the scars are still to be seen along the cliffs fronting the Tappan Zee. The outcry became voluminous, and in 1900 New Jersey and New York created the Palisades Interstate Park Commission to protect the ramparts. Thanks to gifts from J. P. Morgan and John D. Rockerfeller, Jr., among others, the commission owns much of the Palisades but quarries still exist. Just north of Hook Mountain and Short Cove, the Palisades have been worked so thin that from behind they look like a like a stage set. Maxwell Anderson's verse play, High Tor, produced in 1936, is about the efforts of a company to acquire High Tor mountain, at 827 feet the highest point of the Palisades, from its owner, Van Dom. In the play the company eventually succeeds, an ending which outraged Van Dorn's real-life prototype, Elmer Van Orden, who beat back the quarrymen. The Van Orden's old homestead is now (1969) owned by Everett Crosby, who runs the High Tor Vineyards on This article from The Hudson River, the property." published by the W. W. Norton and Co., Inc. of New York in 1969 was sent to us by Melvin and Charmaine Van Orden. Melvin also sent us the following clipping as prepared by the Associated Press March 24, 1942. "... The bachelor Elmer Van Orden 79, whose life on High Tor Mountain was portrayed by the The Old Man of the Mountain' in Maxwell Anderson's play High Tor, has died. One of the best known figures in the Hudson Valley, Van Orden spent all his 79 years in the High Tor Mountain farmhouse, where he was born and where the Van Ordens have lived since the Revolutionary war. In the play, the Old Man of the Mountain was a character who refused to sell out his mountain farmland. That in real life, was exactly what Elmer once did. His only companion was his handyman, August Weltie, 60 who Elmer took in 45 years ago and to whom he always refers as The Boy'."

We recently received a letter from Martha Hemp hill UE, Past President/ Librarian Toronto Branch of the United Empire Loyalists' Association of Canada. She wrote, "I am writing on behalf of Mr. Alex Lumsden, an Associate Member of our Toronto Branch, who is preparing his application and proofs of lineal descent from an United Empire Loyalist.

Would the Maybee society have record of Tobias Maybee (U.E.?) born c1755? His children were Benjamin, William Giles (1780-1840), Francis b. 1848, Jeremy d. 1848, Elizabeth, John and Godfrey.

Benjamin's children were Nancy, Alanson, Lucinda, Wellington, Eli b. 1824, Jarvis b. 1826.

Wellington Maybee married Mary_ and had a son Samuel born in 1848 in Hope Twp. Ontario. He married 11 Sep 1869, Victoria Co. to Jane Avery of Fenelon, Victoria Co. Their son Samuel Orinton Maybee was born at Fenelon, Victoria Co. 20 March 1876. He married Emma McKenney at Huntsville, Ontario 22 Dec. 1899. Their daughter Vera is the mother of Mr. Lumsden.

We have not been able to find any proof of Tobias or of his being a Loyalist. We have gathered the above from letters that his mother had received from now deceased relatives in the U.S. Any assistance you are able to give us will be deeply appreciated by Mr. Lumsden and his mother." A MISSING LINK

I was idly browsing through Mabie names at the LDS Family History center and was struck by the familiar sound of a name, sent to the Church of Jesus Christ Ancestral File by Gay L. Bailey. The name was Linzey/ Linsley/ Lindsay Allen Mabie, who married Martha Collins. He is an ancestor of Allan Maybee, #48; Melvin Robert Maybee, #50; Patrick Maybee Bressler, #100; Brian Brown #143; and Shawna Maybee Gossard, #125. Gay is descended from the Collins line and added one more generation on the Maybees. Linzy/ Linsley/ Lindsay was the son of John Maybee born in New York in 1821 and Rosanna Cook, born 1826 in Pennsylvania. My card file revealed that Wallace Maybee, #74, was also descended from John 1821-1870 and Rosanna 1826-1906. Wallace (Walt) has now added much more information on the family from gravestones, declaration for pensions, etc.

John Maybee and his son Munson Washington Maybee (age 14) served in the Civil War in Co. K-60 Ohio volunteers. When Munson's enlistment expired he reenlisted in Co. G, 13th W. Virginia infantry and served until the end of the war. Apparently Munson's brother James T. Maybee also served with him at that time as medals were available for both of them. (See Communicator #6). Wallace was able to claim Grandpa Munson's civil war medal and reminds us that the medal is still available for James T. Maybee.

Walt writes, "From a deposition to the Civil War Div., dated Nov. 11, 1915, and recorded in Sturgis, St. Joseph Co., Michigan, He, Munson W. Maybee, states: 'In the summer of 1850 I was living with my parents John and Rosanna Maybee, his wife, and at that time I had but one brother living, James T. Maybee. I was at that time but two years old and cannot tell where I was living at that time. In 1860 1 was living with my parents, above stated, at Vinton, Gallia County, Ohio. (This was a small town and I do not remember of any street names or numbers and hardly think that they had any numbers) and I had three brothers living, James T. Maybee, and Linsley A. Maybee and John F. Maybee, and one sister, Margaret Maybee.' End of text. He then signs his mark (X) which is attested by two witnesses."

We learn from his "Declaration for Pension" at the age of 76, at the time of his service with the W. Virginia Volunteers he was enrolled the 22 day of December, 1864 and discharged June 22, 1865. His personal description at the time of enlistment

was: height 5 ft 4 1/2 inches; complexion - light, color of his eyes - grey and color of his hair - light. Since the service, he resided at Mercer Co., Ohio; Indiana; and Steuben and Branch Co. in Michigan. At the age of 76 when he applied for the pension it was reported: "That he requires the regular personal aid and attendance of another person and has required such for 15 years on account of the following disabilities: Loss of vision, one eye entirely gone, and the other very bad, left foot wounded with a gun shot wound through metatarsals, hernia, fistula, and has not worked for any others for 15 years, just tinkers around the house and garden, heart bad and makes him very weak and breath short, his hearing is bad, have to talk very loud to make him understand. Has to take medicine all the time to keep up, and at times cannot get around at all."

Wallace adds, "Note: from a certified copy of the record (#360) of marriage Branch Co., Michigan, Oct. 12, 1883 -Munson Washington Maybee was 35 when he married Barbara March (age 16). ... Munson W. and Barbara March Maybee had three children of record: a daughter, Nellie, and two sons Fred and my Father, John Washington Maybee." Munson Washington Maybee was one of the youngest volunteers in the Northern Army. When President Lincoln called for volunteers, he joined Co. K-60th Ohio Volunteers. When time of the 60th expired he enlisted in Co. G, 13th. W. Virginia Infantry, serving to the end of the war.

(The famous Indian Chief, Crazy Horse was imprisoned and died or was killed there.) In attendance were Melvin Robert, Shirley Faye, Leo Ray, Jacqueline Pansy, Margie Ann, Nancy Marie, and Larry Allan. Those who could not attend, were Harold Wayne, Lois June and Patrick Lee. Charles Ivan, Jr., and Josephine May are now deceased.

"It was hosted by Sister Jacque and husband, Dr. Tom Tibbels. They rented Commanche Hall (1909 Bachelor Officer Quarters), so everybody stayed in the same building which even had a nice kitchen and dining room. At the fort most family members enjoyed horse back or jeep trail rides, a hay ride to breakfast and a tour train ride to the glorious sunset cookout in the scenic foothills. One day we motored one and a half hours to the North to tour the Black Hills of South Dakota. We saw Bear Country, Crazy Horse, Cave of the Winds and of course visited Mt. Rushmore. The tradition continues in that the last reunion is always the best of all. A lot of thought, time, effort and consideration went into this so hats off to Queen Bee Jacque and her Honey Gatherers, Lois, Margie and Nancy and that was a very nice informative booklet they prepared and sent out to the brothers and sisters. ... Linda and Jeff provided a copy of the registry for each of the living children of Pansy and Charles Maybee, Sr. at one of the several meetings and presented a framed copy to the oldest living child Mel-Bob. The entire Maybee family wishes to express their gratitude and thanks for the thoughtfulness of Linda and Jeff Low. Cindy Bryant has completed her work on the Koutz book, The Descendants of John-Jacob Kautz and Sarah E. Christheb. Rachel Sarah Koutz, b. 1831 married Joel Mabie and this book is of her parents. "It's about 250 pages full of stories and statistics of our ancestors Jacob and Sarah Koutz who were born in the 1790's, and their family of ten children, and all of the known descendants that we have been able to locate. This family left Pennsylvania about 1840, spent 10 or so years in Ohio and by the 1850's had settled in Ionia Co., Michigan. Three sons served in the Civil War. There are over 1600 people in this book, many still in Michigan, but many from other states in the U.S. Not all relatives were found. Not every item is filled in." The book is the result of, as Cindy tells us, "two of us cousins working together and pestering a whole lot of other cousins. and years of research. And LOTS AND LOTS of Sharing!" Cindy is a dedicated and thorough researcher (who has generously shared her information with us) and we know it will be an excellent book.
